ANC Named Best Online College in Arkansas

Affordable Colleges Online ranks ANC the Best Online College in Arkansas for Two-Year Schools. Affordable Colleges Online goes on to say Arkansas Northeastern College specializes in community education and business and industry training. Formation of the college began on December 17, 1974 when Mississippi County voters approved the development of a local college district. Today, Arkansas Northeastern College is headquartered in Blytheville, Arkansas and accredited by the Higher Learning Commission. Part-time, full-time and distance learning options are available at the school's Paragould, Leachville, Osceola, Blytheville and Burdette campuses. Approximately 200 high school students participate in the college's dual enrollment program each semester. Veterans services, a wellness center, allied health center and (coming soon) a new center for allied technologies all support social, academic and personal engagement and learning.



Center for Allied Technologies Receives \$100,000 Pledge from D&L, Inc.



Arkansas Northeastern College received another major donation toward its new Center for Allied Technology project as D&L, Inc., of Blytheville made a \$75,000 donation with the pledge of an additional \$25,000 within the next year.

As part of a continuing contribution to the betterment of those in the community, D&L, Inc. agreed to support the construction of an Allied Technology Center on the campus of Arkansas Northeastern College. D&L, Inc. is a full-service HVACR (heating, ventilation, air-conditioning, and refrigeration) company. Their generous commitment has earned them naming rights that will be reflected in the D&L, Inc. HVACR Laboratory and the Harold Newcomb HVACR Classroom (named in remembrance of D&L owners' father).

In response to the announcement of the gift, ANC President Dr. James Shemwell said, "We are delighted to have the wonderful support of D&L for this project and look

forward to utilizing their gift to help us train HVACR technicians for the future."

D&L, Inc.'s donation brings the total of local private investment to \$750,000 as the capital campaign continues with additional pledges anticipated in the near future. Bid opening for the Center for Allied Technologies construction project is anticipated in early 2017 with a target completion date of summer 2018.

A YEAR IN REVIEW

2016 has been an exciting year highlighted by several milestones and important developments. At Arkansas Northeastern College we have collectively accomplished much in which we can take pride.

Report Reveals ANC Graduates as Top Wage Earners: Act 852 of 2015 passed by the Arkansas General Assembly established the creation of the Economic Security Report, designed to provide prospective students, families, and the public at-large with vital statistics related to employment and earnings after college graduation. The Economic Security Report is published by the Arkansas Research Center and the Arkansas Department of Workforce Services using actual Arkansas wage data of graduates of all Arkansas colleges and universities. The 2016 Economic Security Report provides earnings and employment data for 2014 graduates. The data reveals that Arkansas Northeastern College leads all colleges and universities in Arkansas in terms of the average full-time wages for associate degree graduates with an average full-time wage of \$43,854 during students' first year of employment. In fact, the only bachelor degree full-time wage averages that exceed ANC's associate degree average are the private John Brown University and the medical school at UAMS. The data also reveals that ANC performs above the State average for community colleges with every wage and employment rate measure, most in significant fashion, for each credential category: associate degree, technical certificate, and certificate of proficiency. In terms of specific metrics for credential programs at ANC, the highlights include the average full-time wages of \$78,598 for Steel Industry Technology associate degree graduates, \$49,356 for Nursing associate degree graduates, and \$48,880 for Welding certificate of proficiency graduates.

Rural IMPACT Demonstration Site Visit: The White House named 10 communities as rural IMPACT (Integration Models for Parents and Children to Thrive) Demonstration Sites, and Blytheville is one of them. The Rural IMPACT Demonstration will help communities adopt a two-generation approach to programs, policies, and systems to better meet the needs of low-income rural and tribal families and use a comprehensive, whole-family framework for addressing child poverty by improving alignment among service providers to the poor. Doug O'Brien, Senior Policy Advisor for Rural Affairs with the White House Domestic Policy Council and Coordinator of the White House Rural Council, visited the ANC campus on January 13th, along with Chris Masingill, Federal Co-Chairman of the Delta Regional Authority, as the first Demonstration Site visit among the 10 selected sites. Both guests addressed over 100 civic and community leaders in attendance.

Rural Development Partners Grant Funding Free Material Handling Training: Rural Development Partners (RDP), a Community Development Entity certified and administered by the United States Department of the Treasury, is working directly with Mid-River Terminal, a new company located near Osceola to service Big River Steel, both with New Market Tax Credits and training funds. RDP is investing \$90,000, matched with another \$90,000 from Mid-River Terminal, in customized training related to material handling. Working with both RDP and Mid-River Terminal, The Solutions Group has developed a Material Handling curriculum involving classroom training and hands-on usage of equipment such as forklifts, rough-terrain lift trucks, aerial man-lifts, scissor lifts, skid steer loaders, overhead cranes, backhoes, and mini-excavators. The overall curriculum design is delivered over a 4-week period. ANC is delivering the training, which began in April, free to the public during the term of the grant.

3rd Annual Best Practices Symposium: On May 6th, ANC faculty and staff attended three different best practices breakout sessions with 14 presentation/discussions from which to choose. Utilizing the scoring matrix developed by the BPS/ABC task force, the Cabinet issued the following awards:

- Advancement by Collaboration (ABC) Award (\$2,000) to Adult Education & Career Pathways
 Initiative Collaboration by Pauline Linam-Parks, Deborah Lyles-Benedict, Macy Jones, Tara Hice, Beth Thompson, Sheryl Cooley, Sue Puckett, and Joan Eveland in the category of Advancement in Service
- Best Practice Merit Award (\$500) to Unlimited Ability to Retake Exams for General Biology Lecture by Lance Morris in the category of Advancement in Student Success.
- Best Practice Merit Award (\$500) to Energy: An Arkansas Northeastern College Publication by Julie Dorris in the category of Advancement in Student Learning
- Best Practice Merit Award (\$500) to Development of the Associate in General Studies Credential by Dr. Keith Hearnsberger in the category of Advancement in Student Learning

Arkansas General Assembly on Campus: On September 28th and 29th, the Arkansas Legislative Black Caucus, along with the Arkansas Senate and House Committees on Agriculture, Forestry, and Economic Development met in the Governors Ballroom at ANC. Fifteen members heard testimony from State agency directors from the Arkansas Department of Career Education, the Arkansas Department of Workforce Services, and the Arkansas Economic Development Commission. Legislators heard testimony from executives from Big River



Steel and Nucor Steel related to the local economy, as well as testimony from Dr. James Shemwell relating workforce development efforts at ANC geared toward underserved communities. Shemwell reported that ANC's minority student credentialing rate as a percentage of the total student body has doubled over the past decade. A strategic element in this important outcome has been an increased focus upon shorter-term certificates designed for immediate entry into the workplace. ANC's successes in working with under-resourced students are drawing regional and national attention. Both the Winthrop Rockefeller Foundation and the Annie E. Casey Foundation have visited ANC this Fall semester for interviews and other filming.

AETN Premiere Held at ANC: The Arkansas Educational Television Network (AETN) produced an Arkansas companion piece to the nation Public Broadcasting System (PBS) documentary, *Dream On*, analyzing the current state of the American Dream in communities experiencing significant generational poverty. The Arkansas broadcast featured Arkansas Northeastern College and its outreach efforts to underserved communities. On September 24th, AETN hosted a luncheon, video premiere, and public forum at ANC, with panelists including the documentary producer, Kevin Clark, Blytheville Mayor James Sanders, ANC President Dr. James Shemwell, and Dr. Vernon Carraway of the Multicultural Resource Center at Penn State University. Approximately 150 people attended the event. The national broadcast of *Dream On* and the Arkansas companion piece, *A Deeper Look at Poverty in Arkansas*, aired on October 7th.

ANC Hosts Arkansas Economic Development Commission: On November 10th, the Arkansas Economic Development Commission (AEDC) held their November meeting in the Governors Ballroom at ANC. Commissioners held a Bond Guaranty Committee meeting as well as hearing presentations from AEDC Executive Director Mike Preston and ANC President Dr. James Shemwell related to workforce development, particularly the extensive training support that ANC is providing to the Big River Steel mill startup. The AEDC visit to Mississippi County also included a tour of the new Big River Steel mill near Osceola.

Center for Allied Technologies: After 18 months, the architectural and engineering work is complete for the ANC Center for Allied Technologies. Fundraising efforts toward the 85,000 square foot facility will continue through the construction process. The bid opening for the Center for Allied Technologies construction project is anticipated in early 2017 with a target completion date of summer 2018. As a reminder, this facility will consolidate the programs currently being offered at the ANC Burdette Center, Harry L. Crisp Center, and the ACME Center—with an estimated cost savings for the College of approximately \$100,000 per year in maintenance.

Completion of Courtyard Amphitheatre: The Courtyard Amphitheatre project was completed in November. The Courtyard Amphitheatre will be available for use for a wide variety of activities including choir and theatre performances, a venue for outdoor lectures, student talent shows, or other college events. Most importantly, the completion of the Courtyard Amphitheatre project has transformed the former dirt berm into an attractive campus highlight for both current and potential students.

Other Key Developments:

• ANC is part of two consortium initiatives receiving Workforce Initiative Act implementation grants through the Arkansas Department of Higher Education, one with ADTEC (Arkansas Delta Training & Education Consortium) and a second with Northeast Arkansas Community College Collaborative (NEAC³), consisting of ANC, ASU-Newport, and Black River Technical College; the grants will help fund revisions of the Advanced Manufacturing curriculum at ANC, including virtual software and hands-on training equipment, as well as providing a certified truck driver program in partnership with ASU-Newport



- The former Business & Technical Programs division was dissolved and merged into the Allied Technologies Division; as part of the reorganization, the Office of Effectiveness, Assessment, & Planning was created to help inform and prepare reaccreditation efforts
- ANC established its first faculty ranking system allowing faculty members to earn the ranks of Assistant Professor, Associate Professor, and Professor based on accomplishments in the areas of student & dean evaluations, institutional & community service, scholarship, student success, and institutional-specific & discipline-specific professional development
- The ANC Board of Trustees updated the long-range Campus Master Plan to include future outdoor amenities such as a tennis court, two
 outdoor racquetball courts, bocce court, horseshoe pit, small pavilion, and intramural field
- Numerous fine arts productions took place in 2016 including choir concerts, theatrical productions, and community band performances
- The ANC Tours program featured a trip to Italy in March
- Landscaping projects completed include work done behind the B-Wing, west of the Briggs/Sebaugh Wellness Center & the Sun Room, at
 the Leachville Center, and along the southern corridor entrance along South Richard Reid College Drive and the crossing drive in front of
 the Angela Wren Nursing & Allied Health Center

Guzman seems an appropriate candidate for her chosen field as she constantly beams a radiant smile. When asked why she chose to study dental assisting, she shrugged and said, "I like to smile. I like to see other people smile, and I want to be able to help people have the kind of smile they want."

She has no regrets for her decision either as she is really enjoying the program. While she admits that the material can be challenging, she is confident in her abilities and credits her classmates and instructor as being great motivators.

"My favorite thing about the dental assisting program is the instructor (Lisa Childers). She is super cool and she treats us all equally. It's just a great environment. The class is small, so everyone helps each other out. No one wants to see a classmate fail," added Guzman who also praised the Angela Wren Nursing and Allied Health Center as being a wonderful facility in which to take classes. "We get lots of hands-on practice in our labs and it's set up to be just like a real dentist office."



Guzman says that she would highly recommend Arkansas Northeastern College and the Dental Assisting Program to anyone interested in going to college. The Dental Assisting Program at Arkansas Northeastern College is a one year Technical Certificate program designed to train students in the role of dental assisting and upon program completion, perform their duties in all areas of the modern dental office. The program consists of the training necessary to assist the dentist in the dental operatory, the laboratory, and the dental business office. The ANC Dental Assisting Program is approved by the Arkansas State Dental Examiners Board and is accredited by the American Dental Association.

"It's an accredited program and that's great," said Guzman who added that it was nice to be able to start a program and, in less than a year, be certified for a new career so you can immediately go to work. Guzman said she would be happy to have a certificate that would allow her to find work virtually anywhere.

ANC's Dental Assisting Program selects a class each year and begins instruction in the Fall Semester. The program continues through the following Spring Semester and completes at the end of June or Summer I Term for a total of 10 months of instruction and supervised clinical performance. Students successfully completing the Dental Assisting Program at ANC are qualified to apply and sit for the Dental Assisting National Board (DANB) to become a Certified Dental Assistant.

So, what would Diana Guzman tell someone considering attending Arkansas Northeastern College? "I would tell them that ANC is a small college, but you'll feel more connected here. It's a really good place to start."

We couldn't have said it better ourselves, Diana.

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
