It is hard to believe that this semester is at its end. I have watched as our faculty and staff have gone above and beyond in their efforts to provide quality educational opportunities for our students. 
Multi-Modal is designed to make it possible for students to never miss class or the information presented in each class. Plus, with the online component and online resources, students have a great deal of supplemental information to assist them in these classes. Additionally, we have incentivized our faculty to locate or create, when possible, Open Resources for their classes. Open Resources are free materials that students may use instead of purchasing an expensive textbook.

ANC is committed to both the Multi-Modal approach and the use of Open Resources in its effort to knock down barriers that students face in earning an education. Both of these efforts are requiring a great deal of work on the part of our faculty who are meeting the challenge. Because of this and many other reasons, I am so proud of our faculty and appreciate the great work they are doing.

Change is inevitable, but the last two years we have seen it occur at warp speed. The Arkansas Northeastern College has kept the pace, has never lost sight of our students' needs, and never stopped working to meet those needs. We are leading change for the betterment of our students. Instead of waiting and reacting to possibilities that may occur, we plan for those possibilities so that our students never lose their opportunities for educational growth. Mr. Harry L. Crisp, II, was recognized August 19, 2021, at the Arkansas Northeastern College Center for Allied Technologies where a beautiful display bearing his picture and a history of the Harry L. Crisp Center was revealed.

Mr. Harry L. Crisp, II, donated a former Pepsi Cola warehouse to the former Mississippi County Community College Foundation (now the Arkansas Northeastern College Foundation) in 1991. This facility provided our college the infrastructure to implement and offer innovative and successful workforce training throughout the region. The Harry L. Crisp Center became a catalyst in the College's ability to become a leader in workforce training throughout the state and across the nation. For two decades, The Solutions Group has been the largest and most diversified provider of customized training among all of Arkansas' colleges and universities. We have served over 27,000 trainees, providing over 1.25 million contract hours of training, and it all began at the Harry L. Crisp Center.

Because of the success that began and was nurtured in the Harry L. Crisp Center, the College, over time, outgrew the space and began utilizing other buildings that, like the Crisp Center, were retrofitted to meet training needs. The success of The Solutions Group and the growth of the manufacturing base, coupled with the age/functionality of both the Crisp Center (40+ years) and the College's Burdette Center (50+ years), led to the need for a new training center. After four years of planning and fundraising, the Center for Allied Technologies was constructed in 2018 on the Main Campus and brought together the operations from the Harry L. Crisp Center and other training facilities the College was operating.

While the new 90,000 square foot facility is a magnificent structure for world-class training, the College has not forgotten the kind gift of a Pepsi-Cola distribution warehouse that led to its fruition. Mr. Crisp's gift to the Foundation will forever be appreciated. It is with that thought that Mr. Crisp was recognized for the role he played in helping bring Arkansas Northeastern College, the county, and the region into the forefront of workforce development.

Though the former Crisp Center is no longer utilized, the impact of that gift and what it has led to cannot be forgotten. The Harry L. Crisp, II, display is a lasting way to highlight Mr. Crisp and his generous gift. It is a striking showpiece to greet those who enter the Center for Allied Technologies and brings a piece of the College's history to the forefront.

DIPLOMA SQUARED

SCHOLARSHIP

Funded by a \$75,000 annual commitment from Nucor-Yamato Steel and Nucor Steel Arkansas through the ANC Foundation, the Nucor Diploma² Scholarship encourages completion of the Certificate of General Studies (the first year of college for students working toward a baccalaureate degree) at ANC simultaneously with earning a high school diploma. Similar to the Early College Scholarship, students must achieve a placement test score to be eligible for the Arkansas Course Transfer System (ACTS) general education courses offered through the Early College program. The Nucor Diploma² Scholarship is unique in that eligible students must have an achievable path to earn the Certificate of General Studies, or beyond, by the final term of their high school senior year. Eligible students receive a scholarship from Nucor that covers all tuition and fees except for \$10 per credit hour, as well as books/mandatory supplies stipend of up to \$100 per course limited to actual costs. Other Early College students looking to take college classes but not necessarily wanting to earn a certificate or degree, can attend for \$25 a credit hour.

Because the number of slots is limited, students are encouraged to apply early. High School students interested in the Nucor Diploma² Scholarship or the ANC Early College Program, can contact the ANC Early College Office at 870-780-1201.

ANC is happy to welcome Tara Adams back to the College family as the new Director of the Career Pathways program. Adams has 10+ years experience in teaching, advising, planning, and case management. Her focus has long been education. Adams worked as an Advisor for Career Pathways for more than three years before moving to Fayetteville for a year to help with a start-up in hydroponics and teach robotics and coding. At that time, she also worked part-time for the University of Arkansas as an online student advocate. After Covid, her family made the decision to return to Mississippi County to begin planting roots here.

"Mississippi County may not be the place I was born but it is definitely a place I call home. My husband was born here, and he is my biggest supporter," said Adams who has been involved in the community during her time in Northeast Arkansas. She completed the Osceola/SMC Chamber of Commerce Leadership Academy along with receiving the STAND Leadership Certificate and the Community Leadership certificate from the Greater Blytheville Area Chamber of Commerce in 2019.

Adams obtained a Bachelor of Science in Education Degree in 2015 from the University of Arkansas before moving to Northeast Arkansas and working at ANC as a Career Pathways Advisor. She has been a member of the Mississippi County Human Resources Managers Association and Arkansas Mental Health in Education Association. Prior to taking her position with ANC, she served as the interim director of the South Mississippi County Chamber of Commerce.

Adams has always felt like Arkansas Northeastern College faculty and staff were her ANC family. She is proud to direct a team with advisors who truly care about her ANC students.

"My work with Career Pathways affords me the unique opportunity to help low-income parents gain workplace skills that lead to economic self-sufficiency. We accomplish this by facilitating upward educational career mobility in targeted Arkansas industries. I'm excited to be a part of an active shift from traditional strategies that provided only low-wage/entry-level jobs with little to no career development, to now work directly with educators and employers to generate work opportunities for students and serve the workforce needs of our community," said Adams.

As the director, Adams already had an annual audit that passed leaving the state very impressed with Adams' transition into her new role. As she manages the budget, she says she would like to spend more money on tuition, childcare, gas, and course-related supplies. Adams urges anyone who is a parent to come to Career Pathways and apply.



From cooking to exercise to personal computer use, ANC's Community Education provides an opportunity for individualized, personal development both inside and outside the classroom. Whether developing a new skill such as gardening at home or improving public speaking to grow professionally, ANC's community education courses are designed to meet various needs and interests. ANC's goal is to support the community through lifelong learning experiences that often bring people together. These classes are not for credit, so there is no stressful worry about grades. These classes can be festive and fun such as the Art of Charcuterie class which allows members of the community to gather, sip their favorite beverages, and learn how to prepare creative characuterie board displays, perfect for family gatherings and holidays. Additionally, ANC's community education hosts travel opportunities, and we look forward to revamping these enlightening learning experiences as the pandemic subsides.

Sometimes classes improve overall health or knowledge to help others in challenging situations. It is encouraing to organize a CPR class and hear a local mom express her gratitude for a newly learned skill because her child suffers from seizures. The knowledge prepares her to step in whenever there is a need. Additionally, ANC's Allied Health instructors present a "Stop the Bleed, Save a Life" training that increases the chances of surviving uncontrolled bleeding, the #1 cause of preventable death from trauma. Furthermore, educators take the Sign Language 101 class to better communicate with nonverbal students. Our summer camp series provides continuous growth opportunities for our youth, preventing the dreaded "summer slide" where students lose knowledge gained over the past school year. Each community education class has a meaningful story.

The benefits of voluntary, continous learning are substantial and fulfill a natural curiosity to learn, improving self-confidence and motivation while helping individuals recognize personal interests and goals. Times are changing rapidly, which means that community education interests and needs change consistently. Because of these new, ever-changing developments, the Community Education department seeks new suggestions and ideas for future classses and passionate, skilled instructors willing to share their expertise. The best teachers in community education are not necessarily educators by trade but those passionate about their skills and willing to share their knowledge with others. ANC is honored to be among community partners and businesses passionate about community education, allowing collaborations to offer events to the community, shaping individuals personally and professionally.
