Rural IMPACT Demonstration Site Visit to Blytheville, Arkansas

The White House has named 10 communities as Rural IMPACT (Integration Models for Parents and Children to Thrive) Demonstration sites and Blytheville, Arkansas is one of them. The Rural IMPACT Demonstration will help communities adopt a two-generation approach to programs, policies, and systems to better meet the needs of low-income rural and tribal families and use a comprehensive, holistic whole-family framework for addressing child poverty by improving alignment among service providers to the poor. The Demonstration Site initiative is a yearlong program with the first six months being spent planning and developing a combined strategy. The six months following will implement a pilot program based on the first

six months' research. Although no grant funds are associated with the Demonstration Site initiative, private philanthropic groups will closely monitor strategies and outcomes at the Demonstration Sites for future funding considerations. Doug O'Brien, Senior Policy Advisor for Rural Affairs with the White House Domestic Policy Council and Coordinator of the White House Rural Council, visited the ANC campus on January 13, 2016, along with Chris Masingill, Federal Co-Chairman of the Delta Regional Authority, as the first Demonstration Site visit among the 10 selected sites. Both guests addressed over 100 civic and community leaders in attendance.

Big River Steel Holds Series of Local Job Fairs

Big River Steel in partnership with Arkansas Northeastern College and the Arkansas Department of Workforce Services, held a series of job fairs in April of 2016. These events were one of the ways interested individuals can apply for positions at the company's steel mill currently completing construction in Osceola, Arkansas.

The company is seeking applicants for General Production Operators as well as other positions. Hiring plans call for the creation of 450 direct jobs with an average annual wage of \$75,000. Indirect job crea-



tion is underway, with eight companies having announced investments and the creation of more than 300 jobs with an average annual wage of \$45,000.

"Our goal is to hire locally first," said Dave Stickler, Chief Executive Officer at Big River Steel. The company's Flex Mill™ is based on equipment and technology that is the newest in the steelmaking industry. When fully operational, it will produce 1.6 million tons of the niche and specialty steels currently undersupplied and much in demand in the North American market.

Drs. Carraway and Shemwell Collaborate for Upcoming Book

In the summer of 2015, Dr. James Shemwell, ANC President, was contacted by Dr. Vernon Carraway of Penn State University. Dr. Carraway, who works as a Counselor at the Penn State University Multicultural Resource Center, is co-authoring a book with Dr. William J. Rothwell (also of Penn State) and Dr. Patrick Gerity (Westmoreland County Community College in Pennsylvania) entitled *How* Community College Leaders Regard Workforce Development: Opinions, Observations, and Future Directions to be published by Rowman & Littlefield.

Dr. Carraway was referred to Dr. Shemwell by the American Association of Community Colleges based on past projects with which AACC has worked with Arkansas Northeastern College. Dr. Shemwell was one of only 20 selected worldwide to be featured in the book. Dr. Carraway has collaborated with Dr. Shemwell on a chapter featuring best practices at ANC. Dr. Carraway visited Arkansas Northeastern College for several days in June to conduct more in-depth research into promising best practices related to workforce development and to share the results of his research.

More than 200 Compete in T.O.P.S. Challenge

Arkansas Northeastern College hosts the annual T.O.P.S. (Tomorrow's Outstanding Professionals Skills) Challenge each February at the Burdette Center and on the Blytheville main campus. The competition is followed by an awards ceremony on each campus. The T.O.P.S. Challenge is held in conjunction with the National Career and Technical Education Month and is designed to promote career preparation and technical education for the academic enrichment of students still attending school.

Each year more than 200 students from 13 local high schools and the ANC Technical Center, attend the Challenge. Competitions were held in Accounting, Word Processing I and II, Computer Applications: Excel and PowerPoint, Impromptu Speaking, Public Speaking, Business Communications, Introduction to Business, Business Law and Medical Professions-Quiz Bowl. At the Burdette Center, students competed in Aviation, Welding Combination, Welding SMAW, and Plate-cutting, Criminal Justice Felony Traffic Stop, Early Childhood Hands-on and Bulletin Board, Job Interview and Crime Scene Investigation team competition.

These students compete in the approximately 20 competitions for a chance to win individual or team awards. ANC Technical Scholarships are awarded to the 1st place winners of each competition.

Area High Schools Compete in ANC Quiz Bowl

Arkansas Northeastern College is proud to host an annual Quiz Bowl competition each year as an important component of academic rigor and good sportsmanship on the ANC campus. 

Technical Center Students Win SkillsUSA Awards

The Arkansas Northeastern College Technical Center at Burdette took 24 high school competitors and four post-secondary competitors to the Arkansas SkillsUSA State Competitions. 




