# ANC HIRES NEW CHIEF ACADEMIC OFFICER

Following an exhaustive, year-long search, the Arkansas Northeastern College has selected a new Chief Academic Officer. Dr. Keith McClanahan will join ANC as the new Vice President of Instruction on July 1, 2019. In this capacity, he serves as the Chief Academic Officer and is responsible for all academic programs offered by ANC. McClanahan comes to ANC from Ozarka College in Melbourne where he has served as Provost and Executive Vice President of Learning since July 2015.

McClanahan holds a Bachelor of Science Degree in Electrical Engineering and a Master of Science Degree in Engineering Science - Electrical from the University of Mississippi. He earned his Specialist Degree in Community College Teaching and his Doctor of Education Degree in Educational Leadership from Arkansas State University.

Prior to his time at Ozarka College, McClanahan worked for 20 years at Arkansas State University - Beebe where he held a variety of positions including Director of the Advanced Technology and Allied Health Division, Industrial Relations Coordinator, Director of the Economic Development Center, Director of Continuing Education, Director of Workforce Training, Assistant Director and Director of Arkansas State Technical Institute (ASTI), and Director of ASTI Applied Arts at Arkansas State University - Beebe.



New ANC Chief Academic Offer, Dr. Keith McClanahan

McClanahan has experience working in industry as a supervisor and project manager, and he is a 20-plus year veteran of the United States Marine Corps where he gained extensive training, education, world experiences and received numberous awards for his military service and achievements. He began his military career as an enlisted electronics technician and progressed to the grade of Staff Sergeant (E-6). He earned his bachelor's degree during this time and was commissioned a Second Lieutenant in the Marine Corps. He later earned his master's degree and served three years as a faculty member at the U.S. Naval Academy where he taught Electrical Engineering and Systems Engineering. Additionally, he served in various staff and department head positions throughout his military career. He served as an Operational Test Project Officer for the Marine Corps Operational Test anad Evaluation Activity at Quantico, Virginia during his last year in the Marine Corps. His operational testing projects were UAVs (Unmanned Aerial Vehicles) and the Joint Tactical Information Distribution Systems (JTIDS). McClanahan left the Marine Corps at the grade of Major (O-4).

McClanahan is a graduate of the Arkansas Community Colleges Leadership Institute, the American Association of Community Colleges Future Presidents Institute, and the American Association of Community Colleges Future Leaders Institute. Additionally, he is serving as a Higher Learning Commission Peer Reviewer for Open and Standard Pathways and is a member of the North Central Arkansas Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act Board. He also serves as a Governing Board Member for the Arkansas Rural Nursing Education Consortium and has served as a Board of Trustee member for the American Technical Education Association and as a member of the North Central Arkansas Workforce Investment Board. McClanahan has also served on the Searcy Regional Chamber of Commerce Education and Workforce Committee, the Arkansas Association of Two Year Colleges Workforce Training Consortium, and the Arkansas Science & Technology Authority Manufacturing Extension Task Force on Advanced Technology.

"ANC is very fortunate to find someone as qualified and proven as Dr. Keith McClanahan, and we look forward to having him on our team and sharing his knowledge and experiences with us," said Dr. James Shemwell, ANC President. "Dr. McClanahan is well-known and well-respected across the State, particularly in the areas of technical programs and institutional accreditation." Shemwell continued.

McClanahan will be taking over the helm of ANC Academic Programs where he will oversee the College's academic curricula, course scheduling, faculty and program assessment, program development, faculty development, and accreditation preparation and reporting.

"As a first generation college graduate, I am excited to be part of a student-focused and high-achieving college that clearly values student success in all it does. I believe that ANC makes a difference in student lives and in its community through its educational and community activities. I look forward to being part of that effort to help students achieve their educational goals at ANC in my role at the College." said McClanahan.


## ANC HOSTS THIRD ANNUAL EDUCATION DAY

#### **BUS #1**




## PINNING CEREMONY



## ANC Career Pathways Leads the State



Congratulations to the ANC Career Pathways students and staff for leading the state among all community college CPI Programs in overall enrollment, attainments, completions, and employment. The data is based on the 2019 Annual Institution Performance report from all two-year colleges.

"We are pleased to have such strong numbers going into our last quarter," CPI Program Director, Pauline Linam Parks (CENTER) said. Linam Parks added, "Our students along with CPI Advisors, Maci Jones (RIGHT) and Tara Adams (RIGHT), work so well together to have these positive outcomes." Currently, the program serves 222 Arkansas residents who are parents. CPI wrap-around services include one-on-one personal advising, student supportive services that include monies for tuition, fees, books, course related supplies, transportation, and childcare. In addition, the staff assists with employability preparedness.



## **Intermediate Rigging Training for Nucor**

ANC partnered with Industrial Training International to provide approximately 40 Nucor Yamato Steel employees with Intermediate Rigging training. The training lasted three days with one day of lecture and documentation and the other two days of practical hands-on rigging training at Nucor Yamato Steel. The topics covered were: gear inspection, load weight calculation, sling selection, center of gravity calculation, and loading and moving procedures. The training was funded completely by the Great River Economic Development Foundation and the Office of Skills Development. After successful completion of the exams, the participants received "qualified rigger" designations from Industrial Training International.



## MS Project & Excel Training for Big River Steel



Ten Big River Steel employees received 40 hours of Microsoft Project and Excel training by ANC Director of Industrial Training, Stacey Walker, over a two week span. Big River participants included maintenance planners, electricians, supervisors, and managers. Walker covered project planning, Gantt charts, cost tables, budgeting, pivot tables, resource allocation, charting, functions, and formulas. Training was funded by the Office of Skills Development, Big River Steel, and the Great River Economic Development Foundation.

This marks the first year for completers in the program which allows area high school students to earn a Certificate in General Studies or higher from ANC, while still in high school, at only \$10 per credit hour. Nucor Yamato and Nucor Steel sponsor this wonderful scholarship opportunity. NYS Controller Austin Pitzer was the keynote speaker for the event which included approximately 100 people in attendance. There were 22 graduates from area high schools, including 20 who earned their Certificate in General Studies (first year of college) and two earning their Associate Degree.

## **SMS** group at ANC for Training

SMS group was at Arkansas Northeastern College's new Center for Allied Technologies April 11-26, 2019. The group was gathered for a Hydraulic and Controls - Extrusion Presses training. This training involved understanding valve types and operations, as well as pump types and operations. The training introduced uses of the hydraulic diagram and hydraulic circuits. There were 35 participants in the training from several areas - Arkansas, Florida, Missouri, North Carolina, Tennessee, Texas, and all the way from Canada.

## ANC ALLIED TECHNOLOGIES DIVISION CREATES NEW

Faculty and staff of Arkansas Northeastern College's Allied Technologies Division have developed a new cohort offering for the Steel Industry Technology degree that will now allow 75% of the curriculum to be offered online. Fourteen of the 20 courses in the degree have been developed for online delivery with six applied courses to be delivered live. The live cohort of students working toward the Steel Tech degree will continue as they have in the past. The new Steel Tech online cohort will begin with a live course taught over two weeks at the beginning of August before the regular start of Fall 2019 classes. At that point, the cohort will take courses online for the next year and a half. Their last semester in their sophomore year (Spring 2021) will feature the remaining five live courses. During that final semester, students will have the opportunity to pursue paid internship opportunities as available.

Ramping up the number of Steel Tech graduates will help to meet the workforce needs of the expanding local steel industry in Mississippi County which is already one of the nation's largest steel producing locations. Additionally, this effort, coupled with the Arkansas Steelmaking Academy initiative, has the potential to position ANC as the steelmaking training capital in America. Many faculty and staff members have been working across department and division lines to prepare for success with this effort. 
