

Concurrent Credit Programs

ANC is partnering with area school districts to offer an early college credit program. In doing so, many local high school students can earn college credit while still in high school. This early college enrollment program will increase students' opportunities to gain early college credit at a reduced tuition rate. This will save students both time and money to be spent on their college education. Concurrent credit classes are offered to students in general education courses through classes on the college campus or on-line.

Enrollment Guidelines. Students must meet all college placement score requirements for enrollment into college credit courses. Once accepted into a college course, students must complete the orientation tutorial *E-Racer* to learn how to use the ANC student learning management portal online. College instructors will use this portal to communicate with students regarding class assignments and activities, to post grades, and announcements. Students will also have access to all ANC online library resources.

Enrollment Process. Students will work with the ANC Career Coach or high school counselor to complete an ANC application packet. This packet will include a College Admission Form, ACT or COMPASS scores, a Registration Form, and a Parent/Student Authorization Form.

Cost to Students. Costs for early college credit courses are \$25 per credit hour (\$75 per three-hour course). Additionally, there may be a cost for textbooks and/or access codes for on-line materials used in the college course. This amount can range from \$75 to \$150 per course. Many books are available for a rental fee, and purchased books can be bought back by the bookstore at the end of the course. Payment guidelines for all tuition, books, and fees will be determined by your high school, and are available from the counselor or Career Coach.

Academic and Financial Aid Policies. Credit attempted and earned through this program will be posted to a college transcript and become a part of the student's permanent academic and financial

aid record. Therefore, the grades earned, as well as credit attempted and earned, will be included in all college grade point averages and completion rates to determine satisfactory progress for both academic and financial aid calculations.

FAQs

What subject areas are covered by career and technical education?

CTE covers a variety of challenging fields in diverse subject areas that are constantly evolving due to the changing global economy.

Is there any proof that CTE works?

Yes, according to many studies, CTE graduates are 10-15 percent more likely to be employed, and earn 8-9 percent more than graduates of academic programs.

What is Concurrent Enrollment, and why is it appropriate for CTE students?

Concurrent enrollment programs are collaborative efforts between high schools and colleges in which high school students are permitted to enroll in college courses. These programs provide students with a challenging academic experience and the opportunity to earn college credit prior to high school graduation.

Is CTE only for high school students who are not college bound?

No. CTE can provide a foundation of skills that enables high school graduates to be gainfully employed either full-time or while in college. Nearly two-thirds of all high school graduates of CTE programs enter college. Rigorous academic content tied to technical subject matter ensures that these students will be ready for college. The internships and other cooperative work experiences that are a hallmark of CTE are attractive to all students who want to get a head start on a career, whether that career goal is doctor or nurse, automotive technician or computer scientist. Student organizations also help students acquire the employability and leadership skills that will enable them to succeed in the workplace. CTE links high school and community college curricula to help students make a smooth transition to college and careers.



Career & Technical Education Pathways

Career Coaches

Purpose

The purpose of the career coaches program is to extend the career guidance services for students moving from high school into post-secondary education. Extended guidance services can prepare students for a more successful college experience and career by helping them set and achieve realistic goals and develop the knowledge and skills they will need to succeed.



What is career and technical education?

Career and technical education (CTE) programs prepare students to enter the workforce with the academic and vocational skills needed to compete successfully in the job market. Today's CTE provides students:

- academic subject matter taught with relevance to the real world
- employability skills, from job-related skills to workplace ethics
- career pathways that link secondary and postsecondary education
- second-chance education and training
- education for additional training and degrees, especially related to workplace training, skills upgrades and career advancement

What are the benefits of Career & Technical Education

Career and technical education can benefit students directly by providing earning advantages before and after graduation. CTE programs motivate students to get involved in their learning by engaging them in problem-solving activities. These programs provide hands-on activities that enable students to apply knowledge and learn skills for the workforce. How am I going to use it?

Early College Scholarship



ANC's Early College Scholarship is offered to students enrolled in all Mississippi, Greene, and Craighead County high schools (including Buffalo Island Central). It provides a net tuition/fee cost of \$25 per credit hour for up to six hours of concurrent credit per semester for students. The Early College Scholarship applies to live general education offerings delivered to local high schools, and online or live courses taken independently by county high school students while enrolled in high school.

ANC Secondary Technical Center

Arkansas Northeastern College's Technical Center, located on the ANC Burdette Campus, is a workforce education center that offers both high school and college credit in technical programs to high school students in Mississippi County. Services are offered at NO COST to the students. Books, tuition and fees are provided through the Center and funded by the local school districts and the Arkansas Department of Workforce Education. The Center's curriculum serves as an extension of high school curricular offerings by providing students with hands-on training in the following technical fields:

- Advanced Manufacturing
- Aviation Maintenance
- College & Career Readiness
- Criminal Justice
- Education
- Medical Professions
- Welding

Admission Policy

Prospective students may be enrolled at Arkansas Northeastern College Technical Center through their high school counselor or principal. In order to be enrolled, students must demonstrate academics, school attendance, citizenship, motivation, ability, and aptitude.

ADVANCED MANUFACTURING

The Advanced Manufacturing program is designed to prepare students for high paying manufacturing jobs. Students gain basic skills necessary for employment with local and national manufacturers such as Nucor, Tenaris, DENSO, Kagome, and Big River Steel, as well as manufacturing facilities around the world. Manufacturing jobs in Mississippi County typically pay from \$30,000-\$85,000 per year, but can top \$100,000/year for those in management positions. Students will learn robotics, 3D drawing/printing, electronics, pneumatics, and precision measurement in this class, and will be exposed to the high-tech equipment that manufacturers are becoming increasingly reliant on. Join the Advanced Manufacturing program today to learn the skills necessary to begin a rewarding and high-paying career in manufacturing!



AVIATION MAINTENANCE

The Aviation program is designed for students who intend to pursue careers in aviation maintenance or in other industries that require hi-tech maintenance support such as manufacturing. The general education components prepare students to pursue baccalaureate studies if so desired, and advance to positions of leadership in the industry. Students who successfully complete this program will be eligible to take the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) certification exams for Airframe and Powerplant (A&P) Mechanics, which qualifies students for a number of jobs in the aviation and manufacturing industries. Avionics Technicians in Arkansas make an average of \$52,620/year, and can get started by enrolling in the ANC Technical Center's Aviation Maintenance program!



CRIMINAL JUSTICE

Criminal Justice classes at the Technical Center allow students the opportunity to explore career pathways that can lead to jobs as police officers, crime scene technicians, parole/probation officers, officers of the court, correctional officers, and other legal professions. CJ students participate in "hands on" exercises which include CSI crime scene processing, high risk felony traffic stops, building searches, searching for evidence, handcuffing suspects, advanced field sobriety testing, and officer safety. Typical pay for these types of jobs is \$32,000-\$65,000 annually. Local employers for these jobs are Osceola & Blytheville Police Department, Mississippi County Sheriff's Department, Arkansas State Police, Arkansas Game & Fish, Mississippi County Circuit Court, Arkansas Department of Corrections, Arkansas Department of Community Punishment, as well as federal agencies.



COLLEGE & CAREER READINESS

Online Course to meet Digital Learning Requirements of ACT

ANC's College & Career Readiness online course is designed to prepare students for what comes after high school, whether attending college, joining the military, or entering the workforce. This course will develop skills in computer literacy, time management, and interpersonal communications. Students activities will teach balancing a checkbook and managing a personal budget, teamwork, meeting employer expectations, and problem-solving. The course also covers job search strategies, writing a resume, and interviewing skills. Students can choose to take this course for college credit as an elective, and may earn a Career Readiness Certificate (CRC), which is a nationally recognized career credential certified through the ACT's WorkKeys Assessments.



EDUCATION & TRAINING

The Education & Training program offers courses in Child Development, Parenting, and Teaching. Students in this program learn how important early childhood development is, and are offered classroom training in local school districts. Teachers are second only to parents in the effect they have on a child's life, and educational career opportunities are predicted to grow over the next 10 years. Average pay in the state of Arkansas is \$32,841-\$50,604 annually with exceptional retirement and benefits programs, including three months of paid vacation! This program offers valuable training to anyone who wants to work with children, especially

future teachers, and offers CPR certification. Enroll in the Technical Center's Education Program and find out if education is the right field for you.

MEDICAL PROFESSIONS

This program is designed to introduce students to basic health care concepts and medical professions. The healthcare industry offers a variety of fast-growing career opportunities, and makes up almost 10% of the jobs in Mississippi County. Jobs in the medical field require various levels of training and education, and include Phlebotomist, Radiologist, X-Ray Technician, Medical Assistant, Registered Nurse, Pharmacist, and Doctor. Local incomes range from \$25,250/year for a Phlebotomist to \$56,480/year for a Registered Nurse. Senior students in this program have the opportunity to earn their Certified Nursing Assistant certification, and can go straight to work earning \$10-12/hour at local employers such as the Great River Medical Center, South Mississippi County Regional Medical Center, and the Arkansas Department of Health and Human Services. If you're interested in a career in the medical field, your journey can begin in the Medical Professions program!



WELDING

ANC's Welding program teaches students the skills that Mississippi County's biggest employers are demanding. Our welding students work hands-on to learn Oxyfuel cutting, Shielded Metal Arc Stick Welding (SMAW), Gas Metal Arc Welding (GMAW), and Tungsten Inert Gas (TIG) Welding, just to name a few. These skills are used in construction jobs, on the farm, and are in demand by such employers as Nucor Yamato Steel, Nucor Hickman, Tenaris, Big River Steel, Role Coaters, Friedman Enterprises, Blytheville Sheet Metal and Associate Natural Gas, and can earn anywhere \$13-\$25/hour, and up to \$50/hour if you're willing to travel!
