Three classrooms on the main campus will be equipped by the start of classes in January, 2021, with additional classrooms planned in the near future.

This College has been serving the people of Mississippi County and surrounding areas for over 45 years. Our history is strong and so is our perseverance. 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
ANC OUTSTANDING ALUMNUS & ACADEMIC ALL-STAR RECOGNIZED




NAVARRO CHOSEN AS FALL 2020 ANC STUDENT SNAPSHOT RECIPIENT

Q&A with an Early College Student

Libbey Callis is a sophomore at Holcomb High School and has been a student in ANC's Early College Program since the summer of 2019. Libbey is also a Nucor Diploma² recipient.

What made you decide to take college courses while in high school, and why did you choose ANC's Early College Program?

I started taking classes through ANC's Early College Program because I wanted to get a jumpstart on my college education while in high school. My ultimate career goal is to be an anesthesiologist, which will require several years of college and then medical school. Obviously, college and medical school aren't cheap, so the Early College Program's affordability was definitely appealing to my mom and me when I began looking into taking college courses. I am also a Nucor Diploma² recipient, which makes courses even more affordable.

As someone who had never taken an online course before attending ANC, what are your thoughts about online courses now?

Having never taken an online course before, I wasn't sure what to expect, but after learning the technology of the ANC portal, it's been straightforward. The first class that I took was Intro to Communications with Mr. Fisher, and he really helped lay the foundation for what would be expected in an online course. Since then, I have taken 5 other online courses, and they have been great!

What is your favorite thing about the courses you have taken so far?

I am very involved in athletics at my high school, and taking online courses through ANC has given me the flexibility to do my coursework on somewhat of my own schedule. All of my instructors have been quick to respond when I've needed something and have been clear with their expectations on the front end.

Do you have any advice for high school students who are considering taking college courses while in high school?

Don't procrastinate, read carefully, and pay attention to instructions! The Early College Program is a great opportunity, but it's important to take your classes seriously and put in the work.

ANC's Associate Degree Nursing Graduates Performing at the Highest Level

Most Recent Associate Degree Nursing Graduates Obtain 100% Licensure Pass Rate

Despite the challenges faced by the COVID-19 pandemic, Arkansas Northeastern College's most recent Associate Degree Nursing graduates obtained a 100% licensure pass rate. This is an amazing accomplishment under normal circumstances, but with the sudden changes the pandemic forced on the program and students in the spring semester, this year's pass rate is especially gratifying.

The licensure pass rate is based on completion of the National Council Licensure Exam for Registered Nurses (NCLEX-RN). The NCLEX-RN is the exam nursing graduates take to obtain their RN license once they have completed an RN program. The 100% pass rate reflects all first-time testers from July 1, 2019 - June 30, 2020. For ANC, there were a total of 35 graduates from the RN program who tested (29 from the 2020 class and 6 from the 2019 class).

ANC's Associate Degree Nursing Program's perfect pass rate was well above the state average for RN programs which was 84.9%, and also above the national average of 87.9%. These scores reflect the learning that was accomplished amid alternate course delivery and clinical setting changes. While the world has experienced changes due to the pandemic, the health care industry faced immediate, major changes that affected the method in which allied health students could continue their studies. This involved a move to ZOOM teleconferencing and online teaching from the onset of COVID-19 as well as utilizing virtual simulation and other exercises to a higher degree due to the inability to access healthcare facilities for on-site clinical learning. ANC nursing faculty worked earnestly to continue to prepare students in an everchanging learning environment.

"We are so proud of how well the students did on their licensure exam especially considering the fact that the last eight weeks we completed all class content by ZOOM and clinical hours using virtual simulations, case studies, and other critical thinking activities. We honestly didn't know what to expect and we were obviously thrilled by the results," said ANC Director/Associate Professor of Associate Degree Nursing Tonya Pankey, M.S.N., R.N., C.N.E.

"We are becoming more and more acclimated to new delivery methods for teaching and communicating with our students," said ANC Dean for Allied Health Brenda Holifield, M.S.N., R.N. "This has been a learning process for all of us and I am proud of the way we have all responded. Both our faculty and our students are working hard, and I believe the excellent pass rates are evidence of that hard work."

With new processes currently in place in the Allied Health Division, Holifield is encouraging those interested in pursuing a nursing career to check out what ANC has to offer and to start now. Both the Associate Degree Nursing (RN) and the Practical Nursing (LPN) programs are currently accepting applications for their next cohort, which will begin in August 2021.

"If students will begin the application process now for the nursing programs, then they have the opportunity to complete prerequisites next semester before the next nursing class starts in the fall," said Academic Advisor and Career Specialist for Allied Health Programs, Jackson Neil, R.N., B.S.N. Neil also added that now is the perfect time to explore interests in other allied health programs too, such as emergency medical technician, paramedic, nursing assistant and phlebotomy which all begin new classes in January.

"Students interested in our allied health programs, especially nursing and paramedic, should not wait. Students can begin the application process now. Those interested are strongly encouraged to contact Mr. Neil as soon as possible to begin the process at 870-838-2984 or emailing him at jneil@smail.anc.edu," said Holifield.



Arkansas Northeastern College is proud to be home to the most successful Career Pathways Program in the state. Arkansas Career Pathways along with the Arkansas Northeastern College and the Department of Workforce Services work to help move parents forward economically through education, training, and to assist the state in meeting the goal of reducing the need for public assistance. Career Pathways students can receive assistance for not only tuition and books, but childcare and gas also. This program has helped many people gain a certificate or degree to allow them to better provide for their families.

Stephanie Purdy of Jonesboro is one such success story in the making. A 2008 graduate of Brookland High School, Purdy worked several different jobs while trying to find her niche. She eventually worked her way into the healthcare field, where she has been for the past 10 years, but she feels it is time for a change.

"I had been contemplating going back to school for some time and I actually received a flyer in the mail and felt like that was my sign. I'm so glad that I gave it a shot because every single person that I have been in contact wiht at ANC has been so kind and helpful. Everyone there wants you to succeed and will help however they can," said Purdy who is currently enrolled in ANC's Online Steel Technology Program.

Purdy found the motivation to go back to school and do more through her eight-year-old son, so she contacted ANC to begin the process of becoming a student. "I heard about Career Pathways when I had called the financial aid office before I ever even started classes. Career Pathways has helped me tremendously. They have supplied me wiht basically everything I need to succeed. I take online classes and Career Pathways supplies the WiFi that I use, so without it I probably wouldn't be able to take the classes I need to take," said Purdy.

Purdy is enjoying her classes and says that she is learning so much. "My favorite class was math apps for manufacturing because I have always loved math. My favorite instructor has to be Mr. Semmel. He's very good at explaining things in a way that I can understand instead of us just having to teach ourselves from textbooks. He has also done so much to help me along the way. I have had him for a few different classes now and he has gone above and beyond to make sure I succeed."

When successfully completing the program, Purdy will be qualified for jobs within the steel industry that could pay anywhere from \$75,000 to \$95,000. Not only will she be in a position of earning higher wages, but she will not be saddled with debt from attending college. Career Pathways helps in so many areas.

"Choosing ANC was one of the best decisions I could've made. If you want to succeed, then everybody there is going to do everything in his or her power to help you get there. The kindness and compassion is unmatched," said Purdy who also touts the Career Pathways staff as being helpful and motivating.

"I was very anxious when I signed up to go back to school because I hadn't been to school in almost 10 years, and I was just afraid I wouldn't be able to do it. I had talked to my son about it and he thought it was so cool that his mom was going to be going to school just like he was. I was afraid of letting him down, but I had to do it for him and for myself. I'm glad that I didn't let fear talk me out of my goals because coming to this college was one of the best decisions I could've ever made. I have made so many friends along the way and everyone rooting for me lets me know that I can do it."

Meet Mr. Phillip Dever, Chairman of the Arkansas Northeastern College Foundation. A longtime resident of Blytheville, Mr. Dever has been serving the ANC Foundation for the past eight years including the past two as the Chairman of the Board with another year of service in that leadership role.

"Phillip Dever has been such an ardent supporter of Arkansas Northeastern College and we are so fortunate to have him on our foundation board," said ANC Foundation Executive Director Rachel Gifford, adding that he gives both his time and money to support the College. "Mr. Dever is a busy man, but he understands the importance of what we do, and he believes in giving back to the community. He and his family are true friends of ANC.

Dever, a certified electrician, has been a part of the Blytheville community for the past 31 years when he and his wife April moved to the area for him to work at Nucor-Yamato Steel in September of 1989. The Devers have made Blytheville their home and have raised three children, Jeremy, Christiana, and Jaymes, who now have their own families living here. Over time, Mr. Dever began his own company and Dever Industrial Maintenance Solutions is hugely successful today with work spanning the region. The family is deeply rooted in the company and all three of the Devers' children serve on the management team of the company where they all see the importance of skills training for today's workforce. Jeremy Dever has even taught electricity classes for Arkansas Northeastern College.

It was through a foundation event that the Devers became aware of the many opportunities that ANC has to offer. "April and I started attending the Car Parties in 2007 and quickly realized that ANC and the Foundation were something we wanted to support both financially and of our time because we wanted to be involvwanted to support both financially and of our time because we wanted to be involved in helping support higher education in our community," said Dever who has been a strong supporter ever since that first event. Because of his belief in the work being done at ANC, the Dever Industrial Maintenance Solutions Company donated \$75,000 to help fund the ANC Center for Allied Technologies. He also helped to promote and fund-raise for the facility because he understood what the facility would mean to the area. Through his work, his donations, and the gifts of many other supportive businesses and individuals, ANC was able to construct a \$14 million, 90,000 square foot facility to house its workforce training arm of the College. After 31 years, Dever plans to slow down as he sees his compnay in the capable hands of his family, but his work for the ANC Foundation has not ebbed. In fact, he is always thinking of new things to help promote ANC and its foundation.

The nursing center and the technologies center offer some of the best learning opportunities in the state," said Dever.

He recognizes that people are still wanting and needing education and training so that they can better provide for themselves and their families. 

He joined the instructional team at ANC in August, and currently teaches and oversees the College's traditional Aviation Maintenance classes, as well as the ANC Technical Center classes for high school students looking to begin their studies in Aviation Maintenance.

Street enjoys his chosen field, and described working as an Aviation Maintenance Instructor at ANC as a "bucket list" item. His experience as a student at ANC is what drives him to grow the program, and to recruit as many students as possible into his classes. He is especially interested in growing the number of non-traditional students in the program, including female students, and emphasizes the fact that skills learned in this program translate into a wide variety of job opportunities.

"A person considering going into Aviation Maintenance should be aware of all the other opportunities that await a licensed Airframe and Powerplant Mechanic besides just direct aircraft maintenance. Students in the Aviation program receive training that is wanted by employers in many different fields due to the nature of the training," Street said. He continued, "Anywhere that precision machines exist and an attention to detail is required, they want an A&P mechanic. This includes elevator companies, cruise ships, amusement parks and industrial maintenance."

Street also mentions that the program is constantly monitored to improve the student experience while maintaining its adherence to the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) guidelines for curriculum. Citing a good mix of classroom and lab/shop work, Street says that the learning process is hands-on, engaging and very conducive to learning. He is proud to be an alumnus of the Aviation Maintenance program, and is proud to be a part of the instructional team at Arkansas Northeastern College.



ANC ADDRESSES FOOD INSECURITY

The ECMC Foundation announced the launch of its Basic Needs Initiative on November 19, 2019, funding grants for seven entities, including Arkansas Community Colleges (ACC). ACC seeks to scale a Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) outreach model across Arkansas' 22 community colleges. The four pilot colleges involved in the ACC grant are the Arkansas Northeastern College, North Arkansas College, Phillips Community College of the University of Arkansas, and UA-Pulaski Tech. Each college will develop and implement a SNAP outreach plan to address food insecurity among students by operating a campus food pantry and/or partnering with external providers to provide access to meals, as well as encouraging qualifying students with food insecurity needs to apply for SNAP benefits.

In January 2020, ACC signed the Memorandum of Understanding with the four pilot colleges. Arkansas Northeastern College received a total of \$30,000 per year over two years as part of the ECMC Foundation grant. ANC is spending the bulk of the grant funds on meal stipends through its on-campus Sunshine Grille, along with supplementing the College's inventory of non-perishable food items already used to provide emergency nourishment for under-resourced students, including homeless students. The Community Relations division is leading the project for the Arkansas Northeastern College.

To successfully guide the food pantry initiative launching and implementation, Dr. Blanche Hunt, Vice President for Community Relations, created an Advisory Council consisting of the following individuals: Dr. Bridget Shemwell, Pauline Linam-Parks, Courtney Fisher, Kaci Bell, Michelle Bennett, Tonya Harris, Lisa McGhee, Willie D. Williams, Daryl Young, Holly Rice, and Tiffany Nettles. Bobbi McDaniels, SNAP Outreach Advocate for Arkansas Hunger Relief Alliance, was the guest speaker for the first meeting of the Food Pantry Advising Council.

GED classes are the beginning of many educational opportunities that ANC has to offer. Adult Education students may qualify for the Career Jump-Start Scholarship, which will allow those accepted to take college courses while working on their GED. Students work with the Adult Education Department to determine eligibility.

ANC's Adult Education now offers evening GED classes at the Osceola and Leachville Centers. Evening classes will function similar to the daytime classes, which deliver personalized instruction at all three campus locations.

Internet classes and the newly added ZOOM classes also allow students to seek a virtual learning opportunity from home. Students can sign up for either a live class or a virtual class, but if life circumstances change, there is the freedom to switch to another class option. This flexibility helps students to complete goals without delay. Taking advantage of on-campus, virtual, or ZOOM classes at the same time is also available. ANC GED classes incorporate computer literacy, employability skills, financial literacy, and other life improvement skills.

If transportation is an issue, the ANC Opportunity Bus proves transportation for Osceola and Blytheville classes.
