



Using Naloxone to Reverse Opioid Overdose

Common Signs of Opioid Overdose:

- respiratory failure
- slow breathing
- small pupils
- unresponsiveness
- blueish or grayish skin

What is Naloxone?

Naloxone, sometimes called Narcan, is a medication used to reverse opioid overdose.

Can anyone administer Naloxone?

Yes. It is simple to do and could save a life.

What if they aren't really overdosing on opioids?

Naloxone is harmless if given to someone who doesn't need it.

Where can I find Naloxone or the Opioid Overdose Kits?

Arkansas Northeastern College has installed 29 Opioid Overdose Kits across campus. These will improve the capacity of bystander rescuers to save the lives of victims of opioid overdose. See below for a ANC location map of Opioid Overdose Kits and Automatic External Defibrillators (AEDs).

If you find someone who has overdosed on opioids:

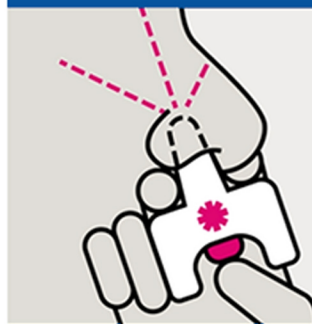
LAY

- Check for symptoms
- Lay the person on their back and tilt their head up



SPRAY

- Insert device into either nostril and press plunger firmly.



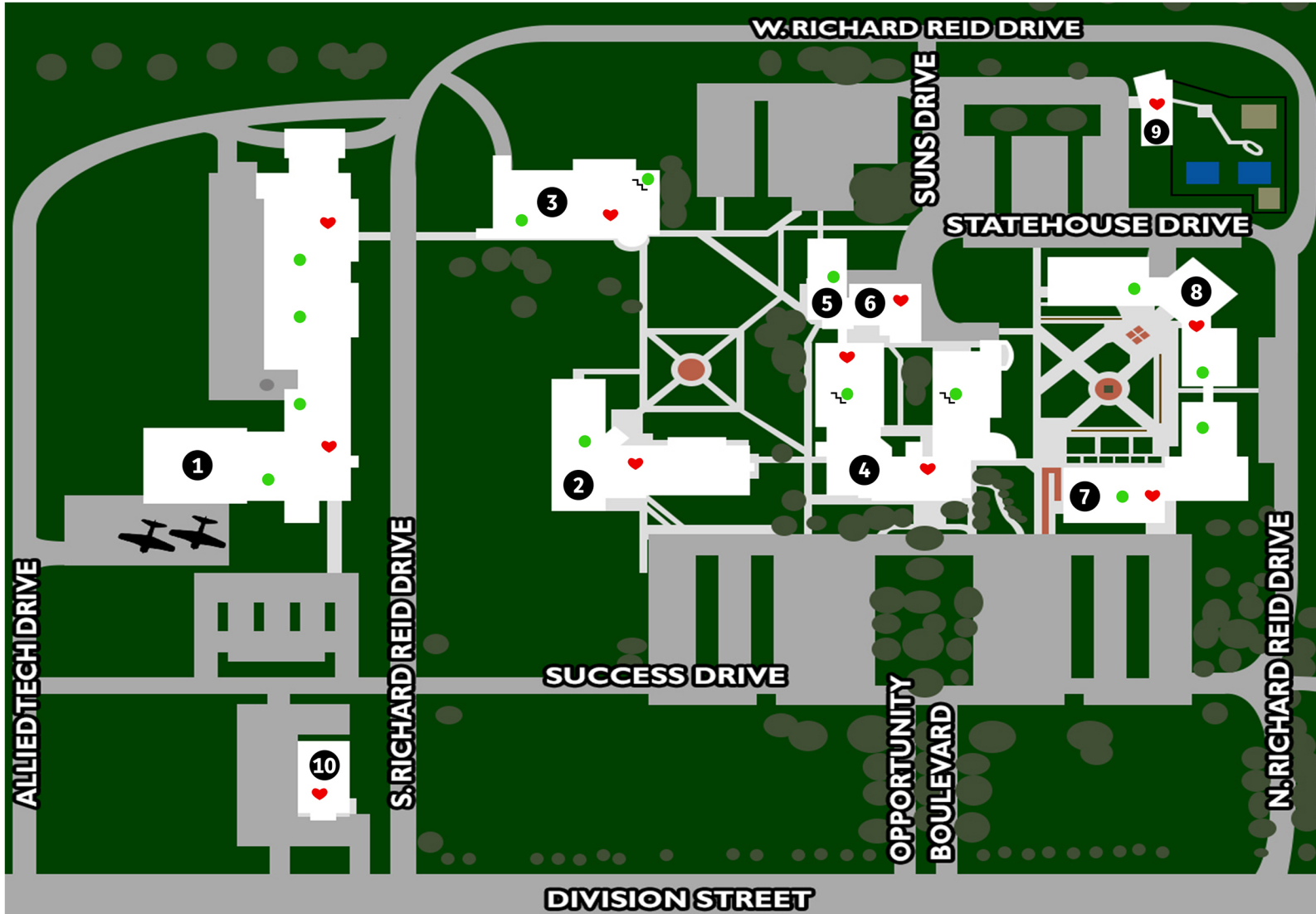
STAY

- Call 911 immediately after giving the first dose.
- Wait with the person until help arrives.
